Four Issues

Contribution to the cost of FOS

- Respondent Firms (e.g. banks) pay £650
- Individuals pay nothing receive 100%
- CMCs pay nothing take a %
- Professional representatives pay nothing take a %

Contribution to the cost of FOS

- Should CMCs and others be able to make a profit with no cost risk?
- No!
- But
 - the number of free cases should be higher (Charities, families and Advisory Organisations are free)
 - the fee per case should be less
 - it should be fully refundable on uphold.

Cases submitted by CMCs & others

- 20% of cases are submitted CMCs (and other professional representatives)
- BUT fewer than 25% result in a different outcome from what the firm offered but many are still referred to an Ombudsman
- BECAUSE cases have little chance of success or are poorly presented

"Professional" representation (1)

- Is there a growing resistance to Professional representation?
- I believe that there is!
- This concerns me more than the fee issue.
